

May Is National Skin Cancer and Melanoma Awareness Month

In observance of Skin Cancer and Melanoma Awareness Month, Stony Brook Medicine's Departments of Dermatology and Surgery are hosting this free program.



Did you know? Skin cancer is one of the more preventable types of cancer with more than 90 percent caused by excessive exposure to the sun. The combined number of skin cancer and melanoma cases account for about 50 percent of all types of cancers.

- **Screenings** will be performed by Stony Brook's team of dermatologists led by Adam Korzenko, MD, Director, Pigmented Lesion Clinic.
- **An educational lecture** will be presented by a physician who specializes in the prevention and detection of skin cancer, including melanoma.
- **Light refreshments**, sun protection items and patient education materials will be provided.

Directions:

Take the Long Island Expressway (I-495) to Exit 62 North, Nicolls Road (Route 97). Travel approximately 8 miles (crossing Route 347), and continue north on Nicolls Road. At the third traffic light, turn right at the entrance sign, "Stony Brook, South Entrance" (Health Sciences Drive). Continue to the first traffic light. Turn left onto Edmund D. Pellegrino Road. Follow signs for parking for the Cancer Center.

Stony Brook Cancer Center is accessible by public transportation.
