** PROSSER PINES COUNTY NATURE PRESERVE ** (PART OF CATHEDRAL PINES COUNTY PARK)

Prosser Pines County Nature Preserve was purchased in 1969. It is situated on 56 acres in Middle Island off Middle Island/Yaphank Road and is a limited use preserve. The chief attraction of the park is a grove of mature white pines that contains a set of hiking trails.

Several plant communities are situated in the Park. The above-mentioned pine grove covers most of the Park. Growing beneath the pine are an assortment of wildflowers. A transitional community succeeding from field to forest is around the dwellings. This community has blackberry, sassafras, locust, red cedar, mountain laurel and black cherry.

Fauna includes rabbit, chipmunk, raccoon, opossum, gray squirrel and numerous birds. Great Horned Owls have been known to nest in the pines.

The original land owner was Billy Dayton. In 1812 he planted white pine seedlings over most of his farmland. Several years later the property was purchased by the Prosser family. The white pines were carefully protected and in time the region became known as "Prosser's Cathedral Pines" by the local inhabitants. The County purchased the property from the Prosser family.

Directions: From West: Take LIB to exit 66 north (Sills Road); bear left at flashing light (Middle Island/Yaphank Rd) in Yaphank hamlet; continue north; Prosser Pines is on the right, 1/2 mile north of Cathedral Pines Park entrance and Longwood Road. From East: Take LIB to exit 68 north (William Floyd Pkwy); take Longwood Road west to end; Make right onto Middle Island/Yaphank Road; continue north for 1/2 mile.

WHEREAS, the Historic Trust Subcommittee of the Council on Environmental Quality has recommended that certain lands located at Cathedral Pines East County Park, Middle Island be dedicated to the Suffolk County Historic Trust; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the real property described in Schedule "A" is hereby dedicated by the County of Suffolk to, and incorporated into, the Suffolk County Historic Trust pursuant to S111(a) of the SUFFOLK COUNTY CHARTER; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the real property described in Schedule "A" is hereby dedicated to the preservation categories designated as (AO) - Archaeological, (AR) - Architectural, (B) - Boundary ditches and lopped tree fences, (N) - Neighborhood Atmosphere, (T) - Trees and shrubs, and (TN) - Terrain, all as more particularly defined in the Suffolk County Historic Trust Manual with specific functional uses subject to the approval of a majority of the members of the Suffolk County Historic Trust; and be it further

RESOLVED, that, pursuant to S111(c) of the SUFFOLK COUNTY CHARTER, the real estate described in Schedule "A" shall not be taken nor otherwise disposed of nor used for any purpose not specified in this resolution unless authorized by charter law approved upon mandatory referendum.

To be dedicated to Suffolk County Historic Trust

ALL that certain plot, piece or parcel of land, situate at Yaphank, in the Town of Brookhaven, County of Suffolk and State of New York, and described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the easterly side of County Road No. 21, Yaphank-Rocky Point Road at its intersection with the northerly boundary of the lands of the Atlantic District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, said point being 1,640 feet, more or less, distant northerly from the center line of Longwood Road as measured along the easterly side of the said County Road No. 21, Yaphank-Rocky Point Road;

RUNNING THENCE northerly along the said easterly side of County Road No. 21, Yaphank-Rocky Point Road, the following three (3) courses and distances:

1. North 04 degrees 24 minutes 20 seconds east, 247.79 feet to a point of curve;
2. Along said curve bearing to the left having a radius of 1178.92 feet, a distance of 535.95 feet to a point of tangent;
3. North 21 degrees 38 minutes 30 seconds west 879.95 feet to a point where the southerly line of land now or formerly of Adam and Mary Depta intersects said easterly side of County Road No. 21, Yaphank-Rocky Point Road;

THENCE along the last mentioned land the following two (2) courses:

1. North 80 degrees 01 minutes 00 seconds east, 195.11 feet;
2. North 15 degrees 07 minutes west, 98.09 feet to the southerly line of land now or formerly of Baier Lustgarten;

THENCE easterly and southerly and again easterly and southerly still along said land the following five (5) courses and distances:

1. South 83 degrees 29 minutes 50 seconds east 273.98 feet;
2. South 79 degrees 59 minutes 50 seconds east and passing through two monuments, 1191.12 feet to a monument;
3. South 9 degrees 17 minutes 30 seconds west and passing through two monuments, 1102.69 feet to a monument;
4. South 78 degrees 50 minutes 10 seconds east and passing through a monument, 772.20 feet to a monument;
5. South 18 degrees 07 minutes 00 seconds west 514.73 feet to the northerly line of land now or formerly Atlantic District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;

THENCE north 81 degrees 30 minutes 00 seconds west, along said last mentioned land, and passing through three monuments 1664.46 feet to the easterly side of County Road No. 21, Yaphank-Rocky Point Road, at the point or place of beginning, being 2,432,654+/- S.F. or 55.846 acres more or less.

WHEREAS, Local Law No. 24-2007, "A Charter Law Extending and Accelerating the Suffolk County ¼% Drinking Water Protection Program for Environmental Protection," Section C12-2(A)(1) authorized the use of 31.10 percent of sales and compensating tax proceeds generated each year for environmental protection, as determined by duly enacted Resolutions of the County of Suffolk; and

WHEREAS, adequate funding is provided for, pursuant to Section C12-2(A)(1) of the SUFFOLK COUNTY CHARTER, from 31.10 percent of the sales and compensating tax proceeds, for the acquisition of such land; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 44-2009, authorized planning steps for the acquisition of said property; and

WHEREAS, the Environmental Trust Review Board has reviewed the appraisals and the report of the Internal Appraisal Review Board and has approved the purchase price and authorized the Director of Real Estate and/or her designee to negotiate the acquisition; and

WHEREAS, based upon the Environmental Trust Review Board approved value, an offer to acquire the subject property was made to and accepted by the owner of said property; and

WHEREAS, contracts to acquire said property were prepared by the office of the County Attorney, executed by the owner of the subject property and the Director of Real Estate and/or her designee and approved as to legality by the Office of the County Attorney; now, therefore, be it

Rollstone Avenue Park

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This project consists of acquisition of property located off of the northerly terminus of Rollstone Ave in West Sayville for active recreational use. The total site area is approximately 14.06 acres. The proposed site plan includes 3 multi-purpose playing fields, a playground area, concession stand and attendant parking and access drive. An 8' fence is proposed around the entire perimeter of the site. The portion of the southern property line which abuts single family homes is proposed to be maintained as a buffer area, with existing natural tree growth to remain and be supplemented with additional screen planting as required. The children's playground area and 1,300 square foot concession stand are proposed to be located in the northwest corner of the site, with the 3 playing fields located on the eastern portion of the site. Parking and access drive will be adjacent to the LIRR along the northern portion of the site. The access drive is 24' in width, and it extends east of the parking area for approximately 1,100' behind single family homes out to Rollstone Avenue.

The property will be acquired by Suffolk County. The Town of Islip will enter into a management agreement with Suffolk County Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation to improve and maintain the property in perpetuity for active park use which will be open to all County residents. The Town intends to enter into a binding written concessionaire agreement with the Sayville Lacrosse Club for the improvement, management and maintenance of the property. In anticipation of this agreement, the Sayville Lacrosse Club has secured \$200,000 from the State of New York to complete the capital improvements proposed. (see attached correspondence dated August 16, 2010)

TRAFFIC ANALYSIS

Existing conditions

The sole access to the site is proposed to be from Rollstone Avenue. Rollstone Avenue is to the east of the subject property, and is under the jurisdiction of the Town of Islip. The closest intersection to the proposed site access is at Rollstone and Brook Street. Brook Street is also under the jurisdiction of the Town of Islip, and it functions as a local collector road for residents north of Montauk Highway. The intersection of Brook Street and Rollstone Avenue is a two way stop, with stop signs on the north and southbound approach from Rollstone Avenue and uncontrolled through traffic on Brook Street.

Manual turning movement counts were collected at the intersection of Rollstone Avenue and Brook Street by the Town of Islip Planning Department on Saturday October 13, 2012 from 11:30AM to 12:30 PM. These turning movement volumes are indicated on the attached diagram.

Anticipated Project Impacts

In order to assess the potential for traffic and parking impacts relating to the proposed action, the Town of Islip Planning Department has focused on the anticipated traffic generated by the three playing fields, as the concession stand and playground area are expected to be accessory to those fields and not to generate a significant number of independent trips. In assessing the potential trip and parking generation of the three fields, we have utilized two sources:

1. Published standard calculations compiled by the Institute of Traffic Engineers (ITE).
2. A traffic analysis completed in September 2010 by Mulryan Engineering, PC for the Ultimate Game Sports Complex proposal in Central Islip. Specifically, we have referenced data which was collected at “Baseball Heaven” in Yaphank, New York on County Road 101. The parking and trip generation activity at this facility was observed from data collected during the peak hour(s) of a Labor Day Championship Baseball Tournament in May 2010. During the study, all seven outdoor playing fields were in use.

Trip Generation

According to the 7TH edition Trip Generation report by the Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE), the highest average of trip generations to “Soccer Complexes” (Land Use category 488) occur during peak hours on Saturdays. There were 5 studies surveyed in Indiana and Washington that show 28.73 trips generated per soccer field in the Saturday peak hour. The directional distributions state that 48% were entering and 52% were exiting. This suggests that with 3 playing fields, roughly 90 vehicle trips during the peak hour could be expected.

The data collected at Baseball Heaven in Yaphank indicates that more trips may be possible. According to this study, 280 total trips were generated within the two hour peak period (12:00-2:00pm), with 7 fields in operation. This represents that 40 total trips were made per field during the peak hours. Applying this rate to the proposed Sayville Lacrosse Club would represent a maximum of 120 trips during the peak hour.

The Planning Department has discussed the potential for these additional trips to cause significant impacts to the intersection of Rollstone Avenue and Brook Street with the Town Division of Traffic Safety and with the County Department of Public Works Division of Highways. Specifically, the installation of a new stop sign on Brook Street at Rollstone Avenue was considered. Based on those discussions and based on the warrants identified in the 2009 Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices, published by US DOT, the additional trips do not warrant the installation of a new stop sign.

The additional trips will only impact the intersection during a very limited time period on weekends. Installation of a new stop sign would impact traffic at all times and could result in an unsafe situation if motorists start ignoring the new stop sign because there are generally many fewer trips on Rollstone Avenue than on Brook Street. Even with the anticipated 120 trips generated by the fields, with the low volumes on Brook Street (262 westbound and 171 eastbound) the existing stop controlled intersection should operate in an acceptable manner.

The Town as operator of the facility can address the severity of the impact of these additional trips by limiting the number of games to be played on a given day, and by requiring that the timing of the games be staggered so that trips from all three fields aren't entering/exiting the facility at once. Additionally, the Town will continue to monitor the situation once the facility is operating and reevaluate the need for a stop sign if traffic impacts are worse than anticipated. With these project modifications, significant adverse impacts relating to traffic are not anticipated.

Parking Impacts

The Planning Department has performed an analysis of the peak parking conditions on the proposed site utilizing the parking generation rates in the **ITE Parking Generation Manual, 4th Edition, 2010**. The analysis referenced in the ITE Manual was performed during a Saturday which would be the peak time of operation for the proposed site. To estimate the occupied parking for the 3 multi-purpose fields the department utilized ITE Land Use Code 488 (Soccer Complex) and observed a maximum parking generation of 74.70 vehicles per field (Average of 56.30). Based on these statistics, the department estimates 224 parking stalls would be occupied during peak utilization.

A maximum parking rate of 48 vehicles per field (7 Fields) was observed at the Baseball Heaven facility. Applying this rate to the proposed Sayville Lacrosse Club (3 Fields) would represent a maximum of 144 vehicles to be parked.

The proposed park includes 230 parking stalls, which appears to be adequate under both scenarios analyzed. No significant adverse impacts relating to on-site parking are anticipated.

Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices, US DOT Section 2B.07 Multi-Way Stop Applications

Support:

01 Multi-way stop control can be useful as a safety measure at intersections if certain traffic conditions exist. Safety concerns associated with multi-way stops include pedestrians, bicyclists, and all road users expecting other road users to stop. Multi-way stop control is used where the volume of traffic on the intersecting roads is approximately equal.

02 The restrictions on the use of STOP signs described in Section 2B.04 also apply to multi-way stop applications.

Guidance:

03 *The decision to install multi-way stop control should be based on an engineering study.*

04 *The following criteria should be considered in the engineering study for a multi-way STOP sign installation:*

A. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multi-way stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.

B. Five or more reported crashes in a 12-month period that are susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation. Such crashes include right-turn and left-turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.

C. Minimum volumes:

1. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day; and

2. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour; but

3. If the 85th-percentile approach speed of the major-street traffic exceeds 40 mph, the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the values provided in Items 1 and 2.

D. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria B, C.1, and C.2 are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion C.3 is excluded from this condition.
